Most animals will benefit from expert veterinary knowledge over the course of their lives, but this session will challenge delegates to view their own work critically and assess what behaviours veterinary professionals may be able to change in order to improve welfare.

This Q&A session gives delegates the chance to explore innovative methods of influencing human behaviour and quiz the experts and vets working on how to practically achieve change in in this field.

In an ideal world prospective animal owners would visit a veterinary practice for advice before making the decision to take on a new animal. But with many practices not marketing themselves at potential animal owners, a lot of future clients don't identify veterinary practices as a source of support and advice prior to purchase.

Taking the new PDSA 'Which Pet?' consultation framework as an example, we will look at the idea of Pre-Purchase Clinics to help the veterinary practice team educate prospective owners. Our speaker from SPVS will look at how expanding the remit of veterinary practices to include a broader audience could work in practice and the benefits it could have for both animal welfare and good business.
